St. Gregory Palamas ~ On the Theotokos, at Her Presentation

The highest summit of all the Saints, the Mother of God, passes, in the words of the Psalm, "Into the place of the wonderful tabernacle", entering the Holy of Holies "with the voice of joy and praise" (Ps. 42:4 Lxx), the inspired sound of those escorting her then, and us keeping the festival now. She is more exalted than the Saints in Heaven, and not only would it be impossible for anyone on his own to come anywhere near to honoring her as she deserves, but neither could all those together who have been saved by her Son, even if all were to be united as one voice. The whole Creation would fall short of offering her the glory that befits her, for she has become the Mother of the Creator of all. How could any words of ours adequately express the great things done for her by her Son, even taking all of us together? Would our words not be as the tiniest drop of water compared with the inexpressible abyss of her glory? Thus is this undertaking beyond my powers, and so far am I from supposing that I can devise words of praise commensurate with the superhuman virtue of the Mother of God, she who is truly blessed and superior in every way to the entire Creation.

But how else can I fulfill my longing, settle my debt, or express my thanks for her countless gracious gifts to me, except by extolling her as best I can? For love persuades me and obligation, both our common indebtedness and my own personal duty, compels me. The grace which I have already received promises forgiveness hereafter for what follows, and the unfailing love for mankind of the Ever-virgin Bride is a continual presence among all those who hear, encompassing all things and holding them in being. For she is near and ever standing by those who call upon her, through her tireless and most effective intercession to God her Son, which accomplishes all things for our good, as we ourselves know, having learnt from the benefits we have received, and having had our faith strengthened as a result. Calling upon her with this faith, I hope to have her as my support to the end as I plunge now into the ocean of her wonders.

Entry into the Temple of our Most Holy Lady Mother of God and Ever Virgin Mary

Celebrated on the 21st Day of the Month November

The Entry into the Temple of the Most Holy Mother of God happened, according to the preserved accounts of Holy Tradition, in the following manner. The parents of the Virgin Mary, Righteous Joakim and Anna, in praying for a solution to their childlessness, gave a vow that if a child were born to them, they would dedicate it to the service of God.

When the Most Holy Virgin reached three years of age, the holy parents decided to fulfill their vow. Having gathered kinsfolk together their acquaintances, and having dressed the All-Pure Mary in Her finest clothes, and with the singing of sacred songs and with lighted candles in their hands they carried Her to the Jerusalem Temple. There the high-priest with a throng of priests met the maiden of God. In the Temple, the stairway led up fifteen high steps. The Child Mary, so it seemed, could not Herself make it up this stairway. But just as they placed Her on the first step, strengthened by the power of God, She quickly made it up over the remaining steps and ascended to the highest. Then the high-priest, through an inspiration from above, led the Most Holy

Virgin into the Holy of Holies, and herein of all people it was only the high-priest that entered one time a year with a purifying sacrifice of blood. Therefore all those present in the Temple were astonished at this most unusual occurrence.

Righteous Joakim and Anna, having entrusted their Child to the will of the Heavenly Father, returned home. The Most Blessed Mary remained in the domicile for girls, situated near the Temple. Round about the Temple, through the testimony of Holy Scripture (Exodus 38; 1 Kings 1: 28; Lk. 2: 37), and also the historian Josephus Flavius, there were many living quarters, in which dwelt those dedicated to the service of God.

The earthly life of the Most Holy Mother of God from the time of Her infancy to the time of Her ascent to Heaven is shrouded in deep mystery. Her life at the Jerusalem Temple was also a secret. "If anyone were to ask me, — said Blessed Jerome, — how the Most Holy Virgin spent the time of Her youth, — I would answer: that is known to God

Himself and the Archangel Gabriel, Her constant guardian".

But in the Church tradition there were preserved accounts, that during the time of the stay of the All-Pure Virgin at the Jerusalem Temple,

She grew up in a community of pious virgins, read diligently the Holy Scripture, occupied Herself with handcrafts, prayed constantly and grew in love for God. In remembrance of the Entry of the Most Holy Mother of God into the Jerusalem Temple, Holy Church from ancient times established a solemn feastday. The decretals for the making of the feast in the first centuries of Christianity are found in the traditions of the Palestinian Christians, where mention is

made that the holy Empress Helen built a church in honor of the Entry into the Temple of the Most Holy Mother of God.

In the IV Century there is mention of this feast by Sainted Gregory of Nyssa. In the VIII Century Saints Germanos and Tarasios, Constantinople Patriarchs, delivered sermons on the feastday of the Entry.

The feast of the Entry into the Temple of the Most Holy Mother of God – foretells the blessing of God for the human race, the preaching of salvation, the promise of the coming of Christ.

How does the devil confirm sinners in their slavery to sin? *From Unseen Warfare*

When the devil keeps a man in slavery to sin, he takes special care to darken him more and more by spiritual blindness, banishing from him every good thought, which could bring him to realize the perniciousness of his life. Not only does he banish thoughts, which could lead to repentance and turn the man to the path of virtue, but instead of them he implants evil and depraved thoughts, at the same time presenting opportunities for committing the sin, which is most habitual to him, and enticing him to fall into it or into other more grievous sins as often as possible. Thus the poor sinner becomes more and more blind and darkened. This blindness strengthens in him the habit and constant impulse



to go on every sinning and sinning. Led from sinful action to greater blindness, and from blindness to greater sins, the unhappy man whirls in this vortex and will do so right up to death itself, unless special Divine grace is sent to save him.

If a man find himself in this perilous state and wishes to be freed from it, then, as soon as a good thought, or

rather, a suggestion comes to him, calling him from darkness to light and from sin to virtue, he should immediately and without delay accept it with his whole attention and desire, and put it at once into practice with all diligence, calling from the bottom of his heart to the generous Giver of all blessings: "Help me, O Lord God, help me quickly, and let me no more linger in this sinful darkness." Let him never weary in appealing to God in these or similar

LESSONS FROM THE FATHERS - Giving Thanks to God

(On the holiday of Thanksgiving) 心经缺乏

Below we present excerpts from the brochure Glory to God for All Things, published by Bishop Alexander of South America.

There is a story about a protestant pastor who, in the course of visiting the sick, entered a mental hospital. There, apparently in a moment of lucidity, one of the patients approached the pastor and asked him, "Have you in any way given thanks to God for your reason?" The pastor was stunned by this unexpected question. No, it had never occurred to him to thank God for such an obvious gift. It was only here, standing in the midst of so many unfortunate and mentally ill persons in the mental hospital, that he understood that his intellect was a great gift from God! The pastor immediately promised the patient and himself that he would thank God daily for his healthy mental faculties.

This vignette from the life of the pastor illustrates a general characteristic of mankind's attitude toward the good things of life, through which people have become accustomed to taking everything as their self-evident right. There are few people who thank their Creator, Who constantly cares for them and sends them countless material and spiritual good things.

St. John of Kronstadt writes, "No matter where I look with the eyes of my heart, whether within myself or without, everywhere I see good reasons to thank and glorify the Lord!" Truly, our entire life is an unbroken chain of God's blessings! He created the body, something better and more perfect than any machine or computer. He instilled in us this immortal, God-like soul to animate our mortal body, the soul which is precious and treasured above all else. He gave us reason, raising us above the animals; free will, through which we might physically and spiritually improve ourselves and direct our life to good; and the senses, with which we might enjoy God's gifts and find happiness and joy in life...

Many become despondent and complain in times of trial. However, one must understand that the Lord sometimes permits us to experience troubles and sorrows not because He has forgotten us, or because He wishes to punish us. No! He allows them to occur, as a bitter but necessary medicine, a medicine to heal us of pride, absent-mindedness, excessive self-reliance, egotism, and other such failings. Recognizing this, St. John Chrysostom said at the twilight of his life, "Glory to God for all things, and especially for sorrows!"

We Orthodox people should thank God even more for making us worthy to be children of His true Church, which through the power of the Holy Spirit maintains the pure teaching of the Gospel, which enlightens and strengthens us with its grace-filled Mysteries. It is that Church to which belonged the prophets, apostles, martyrs, and all of the saints who both reside in the heavenly abode and together with us, their younger brothers, comprise the one, great, Family of God. It is that Church in which we are made worthy to commune of the life-giving Body and Blood of our Savior, which grants us immortality.

Thus, contemplating the paths of God's providence in our lives, we see that it is not so much duty or obligation, but rather our entire being, our present and future life, that demands that we not remain insensitive to God's blessings. One must add that it is not God, but we ourselves, who need our thanksgiving. In thanking God, we are reminded of His love for us, His constant care for us, and the sea of material and spiritual good things which He daily pours out upon us. This reminder enlightens our intellect, gives us the opportunity to understand more precisely the

purpose of our life, and helps us to separate from what is of primary importance that which is of secondary importance.

Moreover, giving thanks to God causes our despondency to dissipate, removes our sorrow from us, returns to us courage and joy in being alive. Giving thanks to God may be compared to the warm rays of the sun penetrating into the dark cellar of the soul. The touch of the Spiritual Sun warms the soul, causing man to become kinder and better disposed to love. The latest us strive daily, and especially on Sundays, to offer thanks to our Creator and Savior. This will serve as excellent medicine for our souls!

Lord Jesus Christ our God, O God of every merciful kindness and compassion, Whose mercy is without measure, and Whose love for mankind is an unfathomable deep: Falling down before Thy greatness, with fear and trembling as unworthy servants, and now humbly rendering thanksgiving unto Thy loving-kindness for Thy benefits bestowed upon us, we glorify, praise, hymn and magnify Thee as Lord, Master, and Benefactor; and falling down again we offer thanks. We implore Thy boundless and ineffable merciful kindness, humbly praying, in that Thou hast now graciously vouchsafed to accept and to fulfill the supplications of Thy servants, so also grant that henceforth we might increase in true love of Thee, and of our neighbors, and in all of the virtues. And enable us to always thank and praise Thee, together with Thine unoriginate Father and Thy most holy and good and consubstantial Spirit. Amen.

Kassiana: Lessons in Divine and Christian Love

(Instructions to a nun from her spiritual father)

- Listen, daughter, to those words of unspoken bravery, which are characteristic only of love. Out of love, the Son of God humiliated Himself, served, taught, healed, fed, strengthened, straightened, gladdened, suffered, was in distress, forgave, and died. 'The Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give His life as a ransom for many' (Mt.20:28). When serving, He served with rejoicing; when sacrificing Himself, He sacrificed voluntarily, not worrying about Himself, but looking constantly with an everlasting, ardent love towards the heavens, at those two other Persons of the Trinity. That is the simple existence of love in the Son. That is also the natural way of men who have love. Because of this, St. Nilus of Sinai says: 'With pain you have acquired divine love: that all will become easy to do and maintain. But where there is no love, there is no repose.' And all becomes difficult and impossible."
- * "Christ, out of love, sought us but not ours. But men, because of their meager love, seek His good things rather than Him. They expect from Him bread, rain, fertility, health, and earthly goods in general. And He gives all with sadness that it is not He, Himself that they seek. They have forgotten that when they have received Him, they have received all along with Him. The Apostle said: 'I do count them all as dung that I may win Christ' (Phil 3:8). Elsewhere he writes to the faithful: 'I seek not yours but you' (2Cor. 12:14)."

GENERAL THANKSGIVING

By the PRESIDENT of the United States Of America A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favour; and Whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me "to recommend to the people of the United States a DAY OF PUBLICK THANKSGIVING and PRAYER, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness:"

NOVEMBER next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war, for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty which we have since enjoyed; — for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enable to establish Constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; — for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; — and, in general, for all the great and various favours which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also, that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions; — to enable us all, whether in publick or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shewn kindness unto us); and to bless them with good governments, peace, and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.
